Gapuwiyak, Arnhem Land, NT
Year 12, 2016, The Scots College
Aboriginal Community Police Officer

In 2013, Delwyn started boarding school at The Scots College in Sydney, more than 4,000km away from his home in the remote Aboriginal community of Gapuwiyak in north-eastern Arnhem Land.

"The first year was a bit tough, being far away from family and in a big city," Delwyn admits. "By the second year, I had found my feet. My English improved, I started getting better grades."

Delwyn graduated in 2016, set on a career path that would allow him to affect change in Indigenous communities. "I was proud to graduate. There are really only a handful of people from my community who have finished Year 12."

Delwyn returned to his home community, landing a job as an Aboriginal Liaison Officer, negotiating the relationship between the police and his community.

"I wanted to go back to the community to be a good role model to others, and to be close to my family."

After completing training in Darwin, Delwyn is now an Aboriginal Community Police Officer, posted to Nhulunbuy, another remote Indigenous community around 200kms from his home.

"I am glad that I went to Scots on an AIEF Scholarship to get a good education. I pushed myself and challenged myself to be a role model for my siblings and be a young leader for my community."

Tahlia Prior Perth, WA Year 12, 2015, St Peters Lutheran College Bachelor of Engineering at Curtin University

Tahlia's mother enrolled her in boarding school because she wanted her daughter to enjoy the benefits of being at a school that could provide a quality education.

"I loved school. I loved learning, seeing my friends every day and having the opportunity to live with them. I didn't realise that boarding school would be the best experience of my life so far."

Tahlia believes attending boarding school helped her build more independence and responsibility. "It definitely allowed me to learn more about myself."

Tahlia couldn't wait to finish Year 12 and start university. "Engineering is something I've wanted to do since I was 15 years old. I couldn't wait to begin my journey to becoming an engineer."

Tahlia committed to her studies and decided to go down the path of construction; she is now working as a project engineer while studying at university.

As a young woman working in a male-dominated industry, Tahlia is also passionate about helping others achieve their goals. "I want to use my story as a female in engineering to help inspire others to pursue higher education."

Tahlia sees receiving her AIEF Scholarship as a case of perfect timing. "AIEF is such a great organisation and they have the most amazing, genuine and supportive team. It's so important that organisations like AIEF exist, because we need to eliminate the gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians."

ABOUT AIEF SCHOLARSHIPS

- AIEF awards scholarships for up to six years of secondary schooling based on financial need, student enthusiasm and parental support.
- The average cost of an AIEF Scholarship is approximately \$26,000 per annum, covering boarding fees, tuition fees, uniforms and other incidental expenses.
- A compulsory parental contribution scaled according to family means, and other available subsidies, is deducted each year.
- AIEF currently supports around 400 Indigenous boys and girls each year at leading educational partners around Australia.
- AIEF continues to support students after they complete Year 12 and alumni consistently achieve a successful transition rate into further study or employment of 90% and above.
- For many AIEF Scholarship Students' families, the financial barriers to attending participating boarding schools are likely to be insurmountable without an AIEF Scholarship.
